The Continuing Dixie Cup Progress Report - The planning and work on Dixie Cup progresses. You should have all received your announcements of the event and have your hotel reserva-

tions made by now. If you don't have your reservations yet you only have until October 2nd to get the reduced Dixie Cup rate. "Why should I stay at the hotel when I live in Houston" you may ask. For several reasons: 1) the blood/alcohol level for DWI went down to 0.08 the 1st of September, 2) After a night of consuming copious amounts of free beer it's much easier to find the elevator to your room than your way home, 3) you can get a little more sleep on Saturday morning before the Milli-Conference 4) the hotel serves a pretty good buffet breakfast and 5) probably the most important reason- if we don't have enough people staying at the hotel the ballroom rental can cost us \$450 to \$850 of the proceeds from registration. Companion"; Greg Smith, author of "Beer in America" and "The Beer Enthusiast's Guide"; and Peter Takacs, Quality Assurance Manager for the Spoetzel Brewing Company (AKA Shiners.) After the conference there will be second round judging and then the infamous Dixie Cup Pub Crawl. The culmination of the weekends events will be with the world famous (?) Raffle and Awards Ceremony. With ALL of your help we can make this the best Dixie Cup ever; but ONLY with the help of ALL of you.

The first note of fall has finally penetrated summer's blanket of heat and many of Houston's homebrew clubs are focused on the upcoming Dixie Cup competition. One of the best things the Foam Rangers ever did was to ask that all the Houston clubs work together to make the Dixie Cup a premiere event. That cooperation has brought the Houston brewing community together, while each club still retains their unique character and strength. As always, The Central Florida Homebrewers will be attempting to win back the Dixie Cup. They enter in force, with quality beers every year. They have the distinct advantage of being the "only game in town" for Orlando, thus there is very little "splitting" of the CFHB entry. That's not the case when Houston's clubs enter the Sunshine Challenge or the Bluebonnet, as every club ends up sending smaller groups of entries, diluting our strength. I've often considered that an umbrella organization would help to make a larger impact when we enter out of state and possibly even give us a chance to snatch the Sunshine Bowl someday. Houston's clubs have taken the first step, cooperating on competitions, keeping each other informed and coordinating their schedules, so nobody's "turf" gets stepped on. 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
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
