

## January Meeting Minutes

Bev stepped up to the Mr. Microphone at 9:04 and began the meeting by swirling the tassel on the fez around a few times thereby catching the attention of the onlookers.

First order of business was the first pub visit to Two Rows taking place on Sunday, February 4th. The drinking commences at 3:00 p.m.

The February brew-in will take place on *Sunday* this month (rather than Saturday) on February 11. Bev will be brewing a Scotch ale. Bev announced that one area that we would like to work on for the club is increasing participation at the brew-ins. It would be great to have several people brewing on these days although there will be only one officially signed up. This would be great for the shop, would be a good way to watch others brewing techniques, increase participation among the Foam Rangers, and get more of us brewing more regularly to increase entries into competitions. Bev is brewing for a future meeting—if others would like to make a Scotch or Scottish ale for the meeting, we could have a taste test and learn from the experience. Thus, come support the Foam Rangers and DeFalco's by brewing at the shop!

Bev inquired as to whether there were interested persons who would like to take the BJCP course. This would likely require a small fee to pay for the beer. A BJCP certified "instructor" would be on hand to help the group learn the best way to judge beer. There seemed to be several interested. If you are interested in taking part, please let Bev know.

It's time for a new Foam Rangers shirt! We are out of the gray T-shirts with the Ben Franklin quote. The idea for an alternative to the T-shirt was raised—a polo style shirt with an embroidered badge. Although the price would be higher for these shirts, it seemed to have enough support for us to look into it.

The subject of the need for a Foam Rangers directory was again revitalized. This directory would include all paid members and would be distributed through the Brewsletter only to paid members. We will be putting this together in the near future, so if you would *not* like to be included in this directory, please let Bev know soon.

Bev also discussed the idea of including the names of 4-5 experienced brewers as a sidebar in the Brewsletter. This way the more novice brewers have someone to call to ask silly questions after DeFalco's has already closed. Any interested volunteers are encouraged to let Bev know ASAP so that their names can be included in the next Brewsletter.

Our faithful Competition Coordinator Joe Lindsey stepped up to tell us about upcoming competition events. Up first is the MCAB qualifier Boston Homebrew Competition. Entry deadline was February 2, so unless you already entered, you're too late! Next is the Bluebonnet Brew-Off up in the Dallas area. Let's submit lots of entries for that one to warn them that they are only temporarily housing the Dixie Cup! Pack & Ship will be on Thursday, February 22. Joe had a brew-in at his house in Santa Fe (where they pray before brewing) on January 27.

Joe announced that the first Dixie Cup organizational meeting will take place on Sunday, February 4 at 1:00 p.m. at Two Rows—two hours before the pub visit. He emphasized the importance of getting organized early to make everything go well. Joe also reminded everyone to start brewing your barleywines and other heavy beers now so that they have a good amount of time to age before entering in later competitions.

Everyone's favorite Putz, Steve Moore, strolled up to the stairwell podium to announce that he would be writing an article for *Zymurgy* magazine regarding how to reduce the time to make a batch of beer. Therefore, if anyone has any tips for him, let him know! He was also looking for a timer and a photographer to record the historic event. If you have any pertinent info, please contact Steve.

Bev took control of the floor again and reminded everyone that Jennings will be taking place on May 19. This is the same weekend as the Sunshine Challenge, so you will have to choose one. Bev will be unable to attend since he has promised to go to sunny Florida.

## Beer of the Month

Jimmy Paige, Secondary Fermenter

*"I Will Make It A Felony To Drink Small Beer"*  
— from Shakespeare's *Henry VI*

THIS month we cover barleywines and holiday beers, beers that are in no way small. These beers represent what the holiday season is all about—a celebration, of flavor, of brewing, of life. These are a culmination or pinnacle of the brewery's talents, usually the strongest and most costly beers, and for some the most flavorful and satisfying, well worth the wait each year.

Holiday beers usually consist of spiced ales that use special ingredients and are produced in limited quantities. Perhaps the most recognizable holiday beer today is Anchor's "Our Special Ale" brewed to a different specification each year and always with a secret spice. Some spices used have included cloves, juniper, coriander, cinnamon and nutmeg. Historically, almost all ales were spiced before the introduction of hops. The key to the holiday or spiced beers is balance—no ingredient should totally dominate the flavor profile. One of the best holiday beers I have ever had was from Steve Roberts' and Steve Daniels' old Galveston brewery. How I wish I had one of those Christmas Ales right now.

Barleywines were traditionally the strongest beers offered by a brewery, the top shelf of beers, beers that truly go to eleven. Barleywines exude importance. Imagine a commemorative barleywine, the George W. Bush Inaugural 2001 Barleywine, a Bigfoot with a Presidential seal on the cap. Hmmm, that reminds me, sources close to the Foam Rangers hinted that Bill Clinton revealed Monica Lewinsky loved to drink barleywine in the Oval Office, maybe Old Horizontal possibly with a mixture of Young's Ramrod, Old Nick, Big Time's Old Wooly, or Old Knucklehead, not necessarily in that order. It is rumored she may have spilled some "Fred" on her dress. However, we failed to learn if she liked a Macanudo, Partagas, or Cohiba with her barleywines. I'm sure many Presidents have enjoyed barleywine, if only Jefferson had pursued the idea of a national brewery then we could have had Teddy Roosevelt changing his mantra to "Speak softly and carry a *Bigfoot*."

The term *barleywine* was used in the 17th and 18th centuries but it was Bass who first put it on their label "No 1 Barley Wine" named for brewhouse Number 1 it was produced in. The English versions are fruitier, and less hoppy than American styles. These usually employ English grains, hops, and yeasts. Common examples

are Fuller's Golden Pride, Young's Old Nick, Thomas Hardy's Ale, and Anchor Old Foghorn. The English varieties were once of higher gravity but have diminished (blame the taxman) being eclipsed by the American varieties which are typically bigger in all facets, alcohol and hops. Examples are Rogue Old Crustacean, Victory Old Horizontal, Brooklyn's Monster and Sierra Nevada's Bigfoot. Barleywines will usually have an OG of 1080–1120, IBUs of 50–100, and have 8–14% alcohol (v/v). These ales are aged from long fermentations and maturation. One home-brewed barleywine I will remember for a long time came by way of our own Sly Bastards who seemed to rule the style in 1998–99 with wins at Dixie Cup and MCAB. *[Don't forget their winning Barleywine at the 1998 Big Batch Brew Batch Old Ale competition either. —Ed]*

I recommend trying a barleywine with some English toffee. If you can't get enough of barleywines seek out the Barleywine Festival held each February at San Francisco's Toronado Bar ([www.toronado.com](http://www.toronado.com)). Or just ask Bev, our Waz, he may or may not recall certain details.

It wasn't the brightest of ideas, to say the least and was insulting to the other clubs in Houston, for which I am sorry.

However, from poor decisions, sometimes great ideas can come. The Foam Rangers would like to offer other clubs the chance to pack and ship your entries to MCAB (Masters Championship of Amateur Brewing) competitions with ours, for free. You can enter under any club you want or even as an independent. One of the benefits this offers to the Foam Rangers is that other clubs will see the Houston entries as a whole and hopefully respond in equal or greater numbers to The Dixie Cup. Raising Houston's profile collectively will benefit all clubs, as the names of the KGB, Mashtronauts, Brew Bayou and Deja Brew start showing up on winners lists, as I am sure they will. This offer is not without risk to the Foam Rangers, as our dues support the cost of shipping entries. Needless to say the more entries we send, the more money it costs the club. Thus, our first big entry attempt, entries to the Bluebonnet Challenge, will serve as a test of exactly how much interest there is and how much it will cost the club. If there is a lot of interest, we may ask for some financial assistance while continuing to coordinate Houston's entries. If there is little interest, then the impact to the club is minimal and those who wish to enter contests out of town still get the benefit of free shipping.

I'd like to urge everyone in Houston who is interested in competing to "Watch this Space" for upcoming competition and packing and shipping dates. While I'm at it, let me encourage entries for the Bluebonnet Brew-Off and attendance of their event, March 23-24 and if you're a serious judge, to assist with their judging sessions on March 10-11.

The leaders of Houston's clubs have worked together to set up our annual calendar of events, which I'll include here as it becomes pertinent. A few all-Houston events you might want to jot down for future reference are: National Homebrew day at Saint Arnold, May 5th, LaTex (Jennings trip) May 19th, KGB Big Batch Brew Bash June 3rd, Lunar Rendezbrew August 4th, Dixie Cup October 19-20 and the Homebrewer's Christmas Party at Saint Arnold, December 9th. Add to these events all the club meetings, brew-ins, pub visits and so forth and you have a pretty busy schedule, with lots of good beer to go around! Making Houston more of a national presence on the homebrewing scene benefits all the area clubs and raises the level of skill and interest locally. What are you waiting for? Get brewing!

### Recipes

When making a barleywine it is strongly recommended that you use a very large yeast starter for optimum results. The slurry from a previous batch will work fine here. Some yeast may not be alcohol tolerant and you may have to use champagne yeast to complete fermentation.

#### "Littlefoot" (for 5 gallons)

15.0 lb. Maris Otter pale  
1.0 lb. Biscuit  
2.0 lb. Light Munich  
0.5 lb. Domestic Wheat  
0.75 lb. Light Crystal

Use 1.0 oz. Nugget hops for 60 minutes, 0.75 oz. Chinook for 30 minutes, 0.5 oz. Centennial for 20 minutes, 1.0 oz. Willamette for 15 minutes, and 1.0 oz. Cascade at the end of

the boil. Use Wyeast 1056 or White Labs California yeast. Dry hop with 1.0 oz. Cascade. OG around 1.085–1.090.

For a partial mash, substitute 11 lb. light malt extract for the Maris Otter malt.

#### English Barleywine (for 5 gallons)

16.0 lb. Maris Otter pale  
1.0 lb. Light Crystal  
1.0 lb. Medium Crystal  
1.0 lb. Light Munich  
1.0 lb. Turbinado Sugar  
1.0 lb. Domestic Wheat

Use 1.0 oz. Perle and 1.5 oz. Challenger hops for 60 minutes, 2.0 oz. Fuggles for 30 minutes, 1.0 oz. East Kent Goldings for 15 minutes, and 1.0 oz. East Kent Goldings at the end of the boil. Use Wyeast 1028, 1318, or any White Labs English/British yeast. OG around 1.090.

For a partial mash, substitute 13 lb. light malt extract for the Maris Otter malt. ♦
